Week 1 - spring colours


Adventure Ted and Friends have been enjoying the sunshine outside. They have noticed many different signs of spring in their new outdoor setting. Join them as they explore the changes in the natural environment and discover and learn about the beautiful colours of **spring**.

Play along with Adventure Ted and Friends

- Look outside for some signs of spring, thinking about the colours you see.
- This could be in any outside space or on your daily exercise in the wider natural environment.
- Take some photos or create a drawing/mark-making of the colours you find.
- Do you have a favourite teddy/soft toy who can help you search for some spring colours?
- Hunt for your favourite colour by yourself or work as a team to find as many colours as you can.
- Hunt inside for coloured items, like the friends did.
- You could look for lots of colours at the same time or stick to one, maybe your favourite colour!
- Make this more of a challenge by setting a time limit in which to find the items.
- A further challenge can be to search for a set number of items for example, try finding 5 first, then find 10.
- Decide to hunt for coloured items in one room only. This will make it more of a challenge.

Play along with Adventure Ted and Friends next week

Next week the friends will be searching for natural loose parts during their daily exercise walks, within the wider outdoor environment. They plan to use the loose parts they find, along with play dough, to make some creative structures. They will also continue to learn about spring.





Week 2 - spring nature hunt

Adventure Ted and Friends went out for one of their daily walks together. They wanted to look for signs of spring and decided to search in the forest. Join them on their **spring** nature hunt.



Adventure Ted searched for some more daffodils and looked carefully at each type, noticing they were different. The Friends spent time exploring the differences.

Adventure Ted and Friends made some play dough and used it to build *3D structures* with the different *length* sticks.

Play along with Adventure Ted and Friends

- Look outside for some signs of spring, thinking about the flowers and leaves you can see.
- Go on a nature hunt, this could be in any outside space or on your daily exercise in the wider natural environment.
- Do you have a favourite teddy/soft toy who can help you on the nature hunt?
- Try to set challenges for your family members thinking about how many sticks/leaves/flowers you can find.
- Think about any differences you notice.
- Find some natural loose parts and see how creative you can be.
- Maybe you will make a den for your toys or create a transient art picture.
- Make some play dough and use it with the natural loose parts and build something special like The Friends did.
- Follow their favourite recipe:

No cook play dough

In one large bowl add:

1 big mug of salt

2 big mugs of plain flour

4 teaspoons of cream of tartar

2 tablespoons of oil

Food colouring (or keep it plain)

Spices, dried herbs, fresh rosemary, lavender etc. to provide a further sensory experience

Take the bowl away from child's reach and add 2 big mugs of boiling water.


Stir together with a wooden spoon until dough forms into a big ball. Place on a worktop and knead for a few minutes. When dough has cooled allow your child to help with this.

Store in a sealed container and it will last up to 3 weeks.

what they needed.







Kneading the dough was hard work for Stripy!

Stripy decided to set an "I Spy" challenge for the others.
Adventure Ted and Senior Ted were still outside, so it could be secret challenge!

I Spy Challenge: count how many small toys are hidden in the natural loose parts and play dough.

Stripy set another challenge:

The 5 minute game

How many circle shaped things can you find in 5 minutes?

Adventure Ted and Senior Ted ran around the house, finding as many circle shaped things as possible in 5 minutes.

Can you count how many they found?

They were very tired afterwards, and had to sit and have a rest. Next Senior Ted decided they should use what they found to make marks in the play dough.







Then Adventure Ted looked at the things they had found and said, "what can we all make now?"



Play along with Adventure Ted and Friends next week

- Join in with the fun this week by setting some challenges for your family members.
- Create some transient art outside using natural loose parts.
- Can you work as a team to make a large picture together?
- Loose parts can be added to sand/bark/mud etc.
- Hide some small toys/items within a transient art design and see if your family members can find these. Play dough can be used for this, if you have some.
- Set each other a time limit and go hunting for shapes around the house.
- The Friends only found circle shaped things but...

Can you find some squares, rectangles and triangles?

Can you can also find some hearts, ovals and stars?

How many did you find of each shape?

- Take it in turns to hunt, seeing who can find the most in the given time. Then create something with what you find.
- Play dough can be used with the shapes or follow Stripy's lead and create without dough.

Week 4 – beads, buttons and numerals

Adventure Ted and Senior Ted went out to play in the garden one day and found a big surprise! Someone had made an obstacle course for them with their collection of loose parts. Senior Ted said it was time to have some exercise and started to run.



Senior ted ran over the big sticks, then climbed a Stick mountain.

The obstacle course continued




Can you join in too?

Stripy set a challenge

different loose part.


6 - willow sticks

Play along with Adventure Ted and Friends next week

- Can you and your family find some small, medium and large sticks to make an obstacle course?
- Can your teddy/soft toy join in?
- You could join in too by jumping over sticks or throwing them into a tub/basket. Crawling under a blanket is lots of fun and easy to do as well.
- Make the obstacle course more challenging by spacing out lots of sticks over a large area and timing each family member as they go over them.
- Do remember that what is most important is the taking part, not the winning!
- Try running, jumping, leap frogging and going backwards over the sticks. Can you think of any other ways?
- The Friends found it easy to make numerals out of buttons and loose parts. Can you give that a try?
- Ask a family member to help, or give the writing of the numerals a go yourself - chalk works well outside.
- You can also make numerals by pushing small items into play dough. Try writing the numerals on paper, then covering each with any small loose parts you can find.
- If you have some wire and beads you could try making some numerals like the ones found in the trees.
- Have fun playing and creating!
